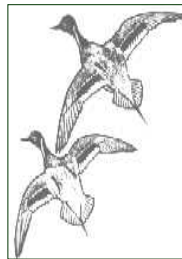

Update on Proposed Firearms Legislation

There is a T-shirt on sale at Zazzle.com which says, “Ignore your rights and they’ll go away”. We all want to live our lives without having to look over our shoulders to see what every level of government is doing for us. But, that’s not always wise. In the current Oregon legislature, there are 24 firearm related bills. Here is a sampling of the bills:

HB 2415

Directs the State Police to identify the states that allow Oregon concealed carry licenses to carry

concealed and that have substantially similar eligibility requirements. Provides non-residents who are licensed to carry concealed handgun in state identified by Department of State Police with protections provided to persons with Oregon concealed handgun license.

HB 2418

Requires the State Police to destroy records obtained during criminal records checks within 24 hours of approving certain transfers of firearms.

HB 2419

Exempts firearm buyers from a criminal history record check if they have a concealed handgun license.

HB 2734

Defines unloaded for purposes of carrying a firearm while operating a snowmobile.

HB 2787

Prohibits public bodies from releasing concealed carry license information.

HB 2791

Removes State Police from the gun purchasing process. Requires gun dealer to obtain authorization to transfer firearm directly from the National Instant Criminal Background Check System.

HB 2792

Provides recognition of all other states’ carry concealed licenses.

HB 2999

Authorizes persons engaged in lawful activity to stand ground and use force in self-defense. Establishes civil and criminal presumption that use of

deadly physical force is lawful under specified circumstances. Authorizes court to award costs and fees to person using force if civil action results and plaintiff fails to overcome presumption.

So far, the bills look good. Well, don't fall asleep yet. Read the following bill:

SB 659 - This bill would prohibit the manufacturing, selling or rebuilding of any firearm that lacks a chamber load indicator.

The chamber load indicator must be visible and must contain text or graphics noticeable enough so that any reasonable person would know a bullet is in the chamber.

It also prohibits manufacturing, selling or rebuilding any semi-automatic pistol without magazine disconnect mechanism

(when the magazine is removed, the trigger locks). Revolvers are exempted.

Now ask yourself - how many of your guns would meet the above criteria?

Aren't you glad OSSA is there to represent you?

Sporter Rifle Matches

Sporter Rifle is a relatively new event for a shooter with any hunting rifle (semi auto, lever, bolt, pump or single shot all work) and a minimum of other equipment.

We shoot at the standard High Power 200 yd offhand target for all positions (prone and sitting/ kneeling as well as off-hand). For those who haven't done that, the 9 and 10 rings combined are 12" in diameter which is the height of the 200m rams.

8 rounds rapid fire sitting, and 8 rounds slow fire offhand for a total of 37 rounds (about the same as silhouette).

There are no alibis (except for range alibis) so you want to be sure you gun and ammunition work well.

For the routine matches, sign up is 0900 and shooting starts at 1000. We usually get done by 1230 (2 relays) or 1:30 (if we shoot 3 relays).

Cost is \$10 for club matches, \$15 for the one approved match (NRA fees are included). We give cash prizes.

The state championship is a 2 day event with 3 matches and very nice prizes (silver plate ice bucket, laser etched plaques, and cash) for \$50.

We sign up at 0800 and start at 0900 for the state event. You do need to be an OSSA (or Wash State) member and NRA member for this one.

- 6/19 club match
- 8/13-14 state championship
- 10/29 club match (tentative- awaiting confirmation from the range scheduler)

What Every Gun Owner Needs to Know About Self-Defense Law

This is the first of three articles on self-defense law

Chapter 1- Introduction

With firearms ownership comes serious responsibilities. These responsibilities take several forms, including—

1. Responsibility to ensure that your firearms do not fall into criminal hands, due to carelessness or neglect.
2. Responsibility to ensure that a child does not get a hold of your firearm, resulting in a tragedy.
3. Responsibility to ensure that when you are handling your guns, your actions are safe and responsible.
4. And finally, it is your responsibility to understand the laws regarding use of deadly force in self defense and to be aware of what happens within the legal system when a citizen uses deadly force in self defense.

Let's briefly address the first

three areas of responsibility before going on to the fourth, which is the main topic of this series. The first two responsibilities require safe, secure storage of your firearms any time

they are not in your immediate possession.

Next, the National Rifle Association and hundreds of private trainers and firearms schools all across the nation teach gun safety and firearms responsibility to hundreds of thousands of people every year. Obtaining training from these folks is how you fulfill the responsibilities in the third concern listed. The Armed Citizens' Legal Defense Network, LLC urges you, the gun owner, to seek out and attend competent training, both to assure that you understand how to meet your responsibilities, and to document your training and knowledge about gun safety and responsibility.

Documented training is part of the antidote to post-shooting accusations that you acted without regard for your responsibilities to society.

This series is designed to introduce you to the fourth area of concern so you can begin to understand your legal rights and responsibilities when using deadly force in self defense. The information in this series should not be considered the sum total of your legal education, but instead, you should think of it as a starting point.

The High Cost of Self Defense
Deciding to carry a gun or to arm yourself for home defense is a choice that should be made only after thorough consideration. Many people buy guns with little thought of getting training and without investigating what the legal aftermath may be if they use a gun for self defense. While a clear-cut case of self defense normally results in no arrest, no prosecution, and no lawsuit, please understand that many, many cases of self defense simply are not clear cut.

For example, what if someone a little larger and stronger than you picks a fight with you? Can you shoot him? At what point in the altercation would you have a right to shoot?

What if three people, perhaps pan handlers obviously involved in aggressively begging, surround you and demand money? When you feel threatened by their insistence, can you draw your gun to stop their aggression?

What if someone threatens your life, so you shoot him, but at the instant you determined you had no other choice but to shoot, he twists or turns away, so one or two of your shots hit him in the back? What if one of the shots in the back is the fatal shot? Do you think you might be prosecuted?

The history of armed self defense

is chock-full of incidents in which law abiding citizens legitimately used a gun for self defense and ended up in prison or were bankrupted because they were wrongfully prosecuted or sued. Let me explain how the aftermath of a legitimate act

can go so wrong.

First, if you are arrested after an act of self defense, you will be provided a public defender or you will have to foot the bill yourself for your legal defense. Most people scoff at the idea of a public defender, but I have met and worked for some very good public defenders. It is very likely that a public defender will be well-respected and well-liked by the courts. That's the good news. The bad news is that in the typical case, there is not much of a budget with which to hire expert witnesses, crime scene reconstructionists and investigators who may be able to track down that one witness who might tell your side of the story. In addition, it is also unlikely that your public defender, or for that matter, a private criminal defense attorney, will have much experience handling legitimate cases of self defense. This is true because most acts of self defense are not prosecuted.

When a legitimate case of self defense (as opposed to a claim of self defense that is offered purely as a legal strategy) comes before the court, it can become pretty expensive, not only in dollars, but also in time and psychological and sociological impacts. For example, if you become the subject of your local newspaper's headline news, your neighbors, your kids' friends and even your professional contacts will likely pass judgment long before a jury does. Your kids may have to face accusations from their playmates that their father or mother is a killer, business associates may avoid working with you, and your neighbors may voice hurtful, ignorant opinions about the actions you took to

survive. You might even lose your job because it is pretty hard to work if you are locked up in jail for murder if you cannot raise bail money. Do you think that losing your job and facing mounting legal bills might disrupt your family life, too? These are only some of the reasons gun owners must understand when it is justifiable to use deadly force in self defense, as well as learning what to expect from the legal system if they are left with no viable alternatives and must shoot an attacker.

Internationally-recognized self-defense expert Massad Ayoob states it best when he explains, "Deadly force is justified only when undertaken to prevent imminent and otherwise unavoidable danger of death or grave bodily harm to the innocent."¹

If you memorize and live that one sentence, you should never be found guilty of a crime involving use of deadly force.

While nuances of self-defense law differ from one state to another, all states allow the armed citizen to use deadly force against another human being when their life or the life of a loved one or another innocent person is in imminent danger. It is not that simple, however, and several aspects of using deadly force can still land you in court.

While one concern entails understanding when circumstances merit using deadly force, the second is making sure law enforcement, the prosecutor's office, and if necessary, a judge and jury understand that you reasonably believed your actions were necessary to protect innocent life.
